The newsletter was established to improve communication between SPHOA and its members to keep them fully informed about everything happening in Shelley Point. I would like to think that we have achieved this goal and that ALL members now feel fully 'in the loop,' so to speak. In fact, multiple platforms are now available to ensure effective communication. In addition to the newsletter, there is the SPHOA website which can be found on www.sphoa.co.za and emails are also regularly sent out from our Estate Manager or Admin Manager whenever necessary. Residentia Trust are also effectively ensuring that relevant information is sent to homeowners when required via the monthly account statements. There are also two very active Shelley Point WhatsApp groups which homeowners and residents can join if they wish to (see details on back page). And in addition, SPHOA chairman Carlos Gomes, will be introducing even more communication initiatives (read more about this elsewhere in this newsletter). We will shortly be sending out a survey regarding the newsletter and other forms of communication so that we can find out what you, the members, require - particularly with regard to the content of the newsletter and communication in general. So, watch this space and please, when the survey arrives, take a few minutes to respond to it so that we can adjust the newsletter accordingly, if necessary.

NOTES FROM THE CHAIRMAN (Carlos Gomes):

Thank you for the vote of confidence bestowed upon me by electing me as Chairman of the SPHOA.

As the Trustees take on the challenge of building on the work done by our predecessors, we acknowledge and thank the outgoing Trustees for having left SPHOA in a better state than they found it – a claim we will strive to also be able to make at the end of our term in office.

I like to begin tasks with the destination or, if you will, *“the end state”* in mind - the Trustees have begun working on this and will in due course inform and consult you.

YOUR participation in helping to define *“the end state”* will provide guidance for the Trustees regarding future investment in infrastructure, facilities and services required, thus assisting in establishing the financial resources needed to deliver on expectations.

In the interim, because the above will take some time to come to fruition, we have set ourselves six strategic objectives for 2020 and they are as follows:

- 1. Developer dispute resolved:** Continue through the CSOS or by agreement, seek a just outcome in the dispute with the Developer. The principle of a non-levy paying minority entity having a “veto right” over SPHOA affairs and finances is not acceptable.
 - 2. Financial sustainability protected:**
 - Safeguard the SPHOA balance sheet through sound management and governance practices.
 - Ongoing critical review of expenditure with a view to extracting optimum efficiencies.
 - Ensuring levies are at appropriate and realistic levels (when benchmarked against other similar Estates).
 - Concerted effort to reduce “levies in arrears”.
 - Adequate forward planning to avoid “special levies”.
 - 3. Safety & Security managed:**
 - Threats emanating from contemporary socio-political environment are outside our powers to fully control. They can, however, be mitigated by the application of “best-practice” methods and technologies to protect the lives and properties of its members, residents, employees and visitors.
 - Safety and Security risk assessment protocol established. Conduct a detailed audit by a security professional not aligned with the current service provider.
 - The audit findings are to be examined by the Trustees and appropriate responses implemented.
 - Establish value adding relationships with St. Helena Bay Police Commander and Policing Forums.
 - 4. Estate infrastructure maintained and enhanced:**
 - Planning and providing for relevant and “fit for purpose” range of facilities and services with the goal of offering members an opportunity to enjoy the lifestyle they desire such as, engaging in social interactions, sporting facilities and the freedom to “lock-up-and-go”.
 - Safeguard all SPHOA assets by regularly scheduling “repair & maintenance” interventions.
 - Carefully planned investment in improving the general aesthetics of the estate in a continuous and sustainable manner.
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5. Environmental issues addressed:

- Continuous positive engagement with relevant stakeholders (Municipality, local industries, St. Helena Bay Water Quality Trust).
- Proactively and where appropriate in conjunction with other interest groups, strongly oppose ill-conceived ventures (i.e. mining and wind-farms) within our immediate environment.
- Protection of flora and fauna on the estate. Address issues arising from invasive species (i.e. feral cats).
- Minimize the negative environmental effects of waste by improving recycling & re-use practices.

6. Community spirit established:

- Encourage a community ethos of mutual tolerance and respect which provides space for individuals to “do their own thing” whilst simultaneously being mindful of the impact on others, especially with respect to control of pets, noise and visual pollution.
- Timeously avail Members and Stakeholders with relevant information.
- Continuous positive engagement with surrounding communities.

Going forward we will, via not only this newsletter but also through other initiatives, keep you informed on progress made.

HOMEOWNERS HAVE THEIR SAY:

Feral cat issue in Shelley Point: Henri Roux sent the following letter to *Shelley Point News* which discusses an alternative solution to the trap/sterilize/release strategy recommended by the animal welfare societies. The original letter in Afrikaans which appears in the Afrikaans edition has been translated into English by Yvonne Collett. *‘I listened to a programme on RSG in which Dave Pepler, the well-known South African environmentalist, TV presenter and presenter of the Kyknet programme “Groen”, answered questions posed by listeners. On that day, one listener mentioned the problem of large numbers of feral cats on their estate which were caught, sterilized and released. The person wanted to know if that action is sustainable and what opinion Dave had on the matter.*

Dave’s opinion, with which I totally agree, is that these cats kill baby francolins, guinea fowls, thick knees and other birds. Even chameleons and other small creatures become their prey. Dave believes that these cats are “criminals” and when they are released back onto the estate following sterilization, one simply brings the “criminals” back. And that, he said, makes no sense. It’s better, even though it sounds inhumane, to have them euthanized by a veterinarian otherwise, he said, the numbers stay the same and decimation continues. Feral cats are, after all, not part of our natural wild life.

I, and many other Shelley Point residents, agree that the most logical way to deal with the problem is to do what Dave suggests. I must, however, warn against interfering with, or trapping, our endemic South African Wild Cat. This is their habitat and there is, for example, a large male that almost daily drinks water next to our home. One can see how he marks his territory by regularly spraying urine against plants and walls. Perhaps there are others throughout Shelley Point? (Editor’s comment – I do understand this perspective but in order to implement it, the HOA would need approval from the required government and animal welfare authorities. Unauthorized killing of cats

is illegal and persons found guilty of this will be reported to the SPCA. The SPHOA is currently investigating various options and these will be communicated in due course. Regarding protection of the African Wild Cats, cross-breeding has made it very difficult to determine the level of pure strains against mixed strains. Where would we draw the line?

UPDATE FROM THE SHELLEY POINT BOARD OF TRUSTEES:

Keeping Homeowners informed: According to SPHOA chairman, Carlos Gomes, it is important to keep members informed. To do so, the SPHOA will adopt a blend of 'old & new' initiatives.

- **Newsletter:** We will continue with this very popular means of communication and encourage members to contribute by sending suggestions and articles via the SP Admin Office or to shelleypointnews@gmail.com
- **WhatsApp:** An official SP Home Owners group is being developed with the specific intent of circulating important information to OWNERS. This platform will not allow a "reply" facility and is not meant as a "chat site" (there are already platforms providing this service; some better than others!) SP Admin Office will be the "administrators" of this platform.
- **Facebook:** The SP Sports & Social Club has agreed to investigate the viability of launching a FB page. We urge all members to participate and make it an informative and positive page, as it will go a long way towards building the image and value of brand Shelley Point.
- **General Meetings:** With the key objective of promoting a flow of information between Members and the Trustees, quarterly meetings will be held at the S&SC Meeting Room. Please note that no resolutions may be tabled or binding decisions taken at these meetings. A meeting is scheduled for Wednesday 25th March from 17:30 to 18:30 Hrs.

Property Development: According to the Estate Manager, there are currently twenty-six building sites of which twenty-three of them are for new residences. In addition, approximately forty-eight sets of plans have been signed off by the SPHOA with building on these sites yet to commence.

Routine and special maintenance operations planned over the next three months: As usual, the Estate Manager has many routine and ongoing and special projects in the pipeline for the next three months. These include the trimming of the large palm trees, cleaning and treating of boardwalks, maintenance of the 19th street boardwalk, building of speed bumps where required, micro-paving of streets, the patching, sealing and painting of roads, the cleaning of storm water pipes and drains, the cleaning and sealing of fountain drains and the application of fertilizer on trees and grass. In addition, the budget for 2021 will be finalized.

SECURITY REPORT (Daniel Plaatjies and Henry Edmunds):

Yet another year has gone by and we are pleased to report that there was only one major incident which occurred over the past three months – an opportunistic burglary which happened in mid-February at a residence in 3rd avenue. Perpetrators gained access to Shelley Point via the beach and entered the residence through an open window. Police are investigating.

The security team was kept extremely busy over the festive season due to the large numbers of hotel guests and visitors to the estate. However, the builders holiday period did give Security a well-deserved break from the day to day operations.

Remember that information from residents is of great value to us so please inform us of the presence of any suspicious persons, vehicles or boats. With regard to possible poaching activities, do not approach, speak to the boat crew or shine lights on them. Rather, note the boat name or number and inform Security immediately. They will then contact the correct authorities accordingly.

ENVIRONMENTAL MATTERS (Niel du Toit):

As you are probably aware, Liam Dyason, one of our new trustees, has been entrusted with the environmental portfolio. At an informal meeting called by our Chairman, Carlos Gomes, a reasonable approach to environmental issues such as interaction with the fish meal producing plants (FPP) and wider community involvement were stressed. Pressure should, however, be maintained on the relevant industries and especially on the responsible authorities.

Water pollution: The quarterly meeting of the St Helena Bay Water Quality Trust (SHBWQT) took place on 11 February. The meeting was chaired by Colin de Kock. It was the first time that a representative of the community was elected as chairman of the SHBWQT. In the past, the chairman was either a representative of one of the fish meal producing plants or a municipal official. We believe that this is an important development and are hoping that the Trust will be more effective in improving water quality in St Helena Bay. The 1,3km pipeline which *Lucky Star* installed to deposit effluent, sprung a few major leaks around 26 January. Colin and the SHBWQT operations manager are in direct contact with *Lucky Star* management and are awaiting their plans for corrective action.

Air quality: The Aeroqual data to date, supports our view that Shelley Point residents, especially along the eastern coastline are, from time to time, subjected to bouts of very offensive odours. We believe that there are certain additional actions that can be taken by the fish meal producing plants to improve the situation. We intend taking this up with *Lucky Star* and the relative authorities. Boulders 140MW wind power facility: Despite numerous objections from the public, the DEADP have given environmental approval for the second Windfarm to be built - even nearer to Paternoster than the current one is. At the last public meeting, a unanimous vote of no confidence was lodged against the environmental practitioner, but this has also been ignored. Since then there have been several formal objections lodged with the DEADP. We now wait to see what the outcome of this will be.

Shipwrecks of the Agterbaai (Billy Steenkamp)

Historically, the coastline from around Laingville to Duykereiland is referred to as “The Agterbaai”. This stretch of coast is geographically characterized by many quaint bays, some with beautiful north-facing beaches and which are separated by rocky peninsulas and dangerous submerged reefs extending well into the ocean. These bays have been named and renamed several times by the settlers during the past 500 years with names like Britannia Bay, Mother of Pearl Bay (Perlemoenbaai), Kaloeniebaai and many more.

This rugged coastline has seen the demise of many a ship caused by factors ranging from adverse weather conditions to drunk captains. Many of these wrecks and their stories are well known - for example, the Britannia (1826) and the Sea Trader (1976) - and have been the subject of numerous salvage operations during the past hundred years. Apart from the “Sea Trader”, the wrecks are all submerged and their exact positions remain a mystery to the public due to jealously-guarded secrets kept by salvage divers, recreational scuba divers and spear fisherman.

For the last six years, we have made it our mission to relocate these wrecks and to discover hitherto unknown wrecks using geophysical technology. This has turned out to be great fun especially when you dive to confirm a wreck. In the process, seven wrecks have been relocated and at least four new ones have been found. What is especially great is that some of these wrecks lie in shallow and safe waters and can be explored by novice free divers and scuba divers. The hunt for unknown wrecks entails quite a bit of research into folklore and interesting discussions of topics that border on treasure hunting. For example, the recent

discovery of a 1792 map of St. Helena Bay refers to an American ship that stranded “two and a half years before” in “Mother of Pearl” bay. Can we find it?

Future newsletters will probably contain short articles discussing some of these wrecks and sharing their stories.



Diving on the wreck of the “Sea Trader”

Update on feral cats (Terry Mackintosh):

As predicted three years ago, we now have a serious problem with large numbers of unsterilized cats roaming the estate. I was very surprised to see this very issue raised recently on one of the local Shelley Point WhatsApp groups where many individuals were calling for something to be done and for an action plan to be drawn up to solve the problem.

Three years ago, I attempted to do just that. I contacted the local authorities who advised that the only way to control the problem was to trap, sterilize and release. Killing feral cats is not only illegal and will result in prosecution but it also does nothing to solve the problem. Any cats leaving a territory simply create a vacuum which allows other ferals from other areas to come in. So, with the help of Nikki Bauer of the SPCA, we managed to negotiate significantly reduced rates from Wesland Animal Hospital for sterilization of Shelley Point feral cats. I also repeatedly asked for donations from homeowners and residents but other than a mere handful of donors, nothing much came of that. I also organized for the purchase of an expensive cat trap and then asked each homeowner to take responsibility for just ONE cat from their area. I figured that if every homeowner arranged for the trapping of one cat, followed by the transport of the cat to and from the animal hospital, payment of the sterilization fees and then subsequent release back into the area, our problem would be largely solved as it would mean a huge reduction in the number of kittens born into the area. Once again, other than a few individuals, nobody bothered to assist. So now we are faced with a massive problem with ever-increasing numbers of feral cats and individuals calling for an action plan!



Recently however, thanks to a handful of committed and dedicated homeowners, we are slowly starting to make some inroads. Residents in the area of 1st to 6th streets such as Estelle Coetzee and the Karpul family have been particularly active in ensuring the sterilization of adult cats and the finding of homes for kittens. And Nico and Karien Kemp of 13th street have also been particularly proactive and have mounted a trap/sterilization/release programme which has seen the successful sterilization of several cats. And finally, Rika and Henry Edmunds have been personally responsible for sterilizing sixteen cats. These and other homeowners have funded this virtually out of their own pockets!

So please homeowners and residents, we appeal *once again* to you all to help – either by volunteering to trap and transport cats to and from Wesland or to provide financial assistance towards sterilization costs (any donations can be given to Lindy at the office). Do your bit for the Estate even if it means taking responsibility for just one cat!
